8	EXPRESSING REGRET FOR THE STATE OF ALABAMA'S
9	INVOLVEMENT IN THE FAILURE TO PROSECUTE CRIMES COMMITTED
10	AGAINST RECY TAYLOR.
11	
12	WHEREAS, on September 3, 1944, in the small Town of
13	Abbeville, Alabama, Recy Taylor, a young Black mother was
14	walking home from church with her companions when she was
15	confronted by a car of seven white men; the men forced Ms.
16	Taylor into the car at knife and gunpoint, drove off, and six
17	of the seven men brutally raped her in a deserted grove of
18	pine trees; and
19	WHEREAS, Taylor's younger brother, Robert Corbitt,
20	of Abbeville, said he remembers the day his sister was raped
21	67 years ago like it was yesterday, saying the police tried to
22	blame his sister, and the family was harassed so that he was
23	not allowed to play in the front yard; and
24	WHEREAS, an all white, all male grand jury failed to
25	bring any charges for indictment; and then Governor Chauncey
26	Sparks ordered a second investigation, and the grand jury
27	again failed to indict; and

1 WHEREAS, the case got the attention of NAACP
2 activist Rosa Parks, who interviewed Taylor in 1944 in
3 Abbeville and later recruited other activists to create the
4 "Alabama Committee for Equal Justice for Mrs. Recy Taylor";
5 and

WHEREAS, in an interview last year with the AP, Recy Taylor, who now resides in Florida, said she eventually gave up trying to bring charges against the men; and

WHEREAS, this deplorable lack of justice remains a source of shame for all Alabamians; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we acknowledge the lack of prosecution for crimes committed against Recy Taylor by the government of the State of Alabama, that we declare such failure to act was, and is, morally abhorrent and repugnant, and that we do hereby express profound regret for the role played by the government of the State of Alabama in failing to prosecute the crimes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we express our deepest sympathies and solemn regrets to Recy Taylor and her family and friends.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That it is the specific intent of the Legislature that reparations shall not be considered or made regarding past actions of the government of the State of Alabama concerning the lack of prosecution of the crimes committed against Recy Taylor, and that this resolution
